Re: Support for Senate Bill 973: Wildfire County Coordinator Program

Dear Chair Cervantes;

On behalf of the undersigned organizations, we write in strong support of SB 973 legislation, as amended on April 13, 2026, that will meaningfully strengthen community wildfire resilience across California.

Wildfires continue to pose an escalating threat to life, property, public health, and the state's economy. Proven, proactive strategies—such as home hardening, defensible space, fuels reduction, evacuation planning, and community education—significantly reduce wildfire risk. However, many communities lack the technical and administrative capacity needed to plan, prioritize, and implement these solutions at scale.

SB 973 addresses this challenge by establishing a statewide framework that pairs standardized, state-led guidance for assessing wildfire risk and prioritizing the mitigations that matter with locally delivered implementation capacity. Importantly, the bill codifies and expands the Wildfire County Coordinator Program, a proven initiative delivered in partnership between CAL FIRE and the California Fire Safe Council since 2021.

Since 2021, the Wildfire County Coordinator Program has received funding from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, through a \$10.9M Wildfire Prevention grant, and from the General Fund, through a \$9.5M direct program appropriation. The County Coordinator Program is currently funded through the end of calendar year 2027 and will have minimal fiscal impact on the 2026-27 fiscal year.

State investment in community wildfire risk reduction will 'bend the curve' of urban conflagration risk and lower the costs of catastrophic wildfires. The recently released [SB 254](#) report presented the California Legislature with recommendations to address the statewide economic consequences of catastrophic wildfires. Under "Pathway 1 - Commit to Community Wildfire Risk Reduction", the SB 254 report recommends that the state "supports community mitigation planning and implementation through programs like CAL FIRE's Wildfire County Coordinator initiative, a partnership between CAL FIRE and the California Fire Safe Council to build local capacity for wildfire mitigation." (SB 254 report, pg 51).

The Wildfire County Coordinator Program has demonstrated measurable success by strengthening county-level coordination, securing over \$104 million for local mitigation projects, educating nearly 1 million residents in high-risk communities, establishing over 100 new Fire Safe Councils and FireWise Communities, and building durable partnerships across jurisdictions. The program provides flexibility to build this wildfire capacity at whichever host entity makes most sense in each county, be it the county government, countywide Fire Safe Council, local resource conservation district, or other local entity.

County-level coordination is essential to achieving community-scale wildfire resilience. Counties are uniquely positioned to enable action across city, special district, and land ownership boundaries while maintaining direct working relationships with local fire agencies, building officials, planners, public health departments, and residents. Through their County Coordinators, counties can effectively translate statewide wildfire resilience goals into coordinated, on-the-ground action aligned with regional landscape resilience efforts. By placing this program

into statute, SB 973 ensures stability, accountability, and long-term impact—while requiring no new appropriation to support this program this year beyond existing funding.

The bill also strengthens the effectiveness and consistency of mitigation investments by directing CAL FIRE to develop standardized wildfire risk assessment guidance and planning tools to support the work of the Wildfire County Coordinators and other similar efforts. This approach helps ensure limited public resources are targeted to the highest-risk areas and most impactful projects, while preserving flexibility for locally informed decision-making. By advancing proactive, science-informed planning and locally delivered implementation, SB 973 helps reduce the scale and severity of catastrophic wildfires—protecting natural resources, watersheds, wildlife habitat, and working lands while avoiding higher long-term costs associated with emergency response, ecosystem damage, and post-fire recovery.

SB 973 represents a practical, cost-effective approach to advancing California’s wildfire strategy through data-driven, locally implemented solutions. It strengthens public safety, supports community resilience and insurability, and improves returns on the state’s wildfire investments.

For these reasons, we strongly support SB 973.
